

Winter Weather Reminders from Oak Forest



This diagram demonstrates the appropriate way to remove snow from your driveway. Clear Area (allows plow to unload before driveway)

Village View

With a winter storm slated to impact the area tomorrow, please remember that the city prohibits residents from

parking vehicles on city streets after 2 inches of snow has fallen so that Public Works crews can clear and salt the streets effectively and efficiently.

Read ordinance 73.09 Snow Emergencies for more detail.

Things to Keep in Mind: Vehicles must remain off city streets for 12 hours after the end of snowfall or risk being ticketed or towed. If your vehicle is towed, you could face fines of more than \$250. No warnings will be issued.

Be patient as the plows make their way through town: main roads, side streets, courts. Please keep in mind that several state and local agencies other than the city are responsible for snow removal on some roads.

Pushing snow into the street is hazardous. Do not shovel or blow snow from driveways into the streets as this can cause a hazard and is also against city ordinance. When snow is shoveled into the street, the plow is likely to push it right back in front of the driveway. Although the city's plows may leave some snow across driveway entrances, they try to keep it to a minimum. The Public Works Department will not remove snow from driveway entrances.

Mailbox damage and fire hydrants in Oak Forest

If your mailbox is damaged, call the Public Works

Department. If a city plow physically strikes and damages your mailbox, Public Works will replace it with a standard mailbox as long as it was located in accordance with post office and city standards. Incorrectly located mailboxes knocked down from the weight of snow rolling off the plows is the responsibility of the resident to replace.

Read the mailbox installation and maintenance standards.

The Public Works Department is not responsible for decorative or brick mailboxes. If a decorative or brick mailbox is struck by a plow, a resident may be eligible for a reimbursement up to \$40 from the city.

Contact the Public Works Department to request an inspection of your damaged mailbox at 708-535-4090.

If you are able to do so, please clear the hydrants on your block for better accessibility for the fire department.



Snow Season in Palos Park

The Public Works Department snow operations are ready for the winter weather conditions. Please assist Public Works with the clearing of snow and ice from the roads by following these directions:

Do not plow or shovel snow into the street. Move snow to non-paved areas. After a street has been plowed, snowplows will not return to clear patches of snow that have been redeposited onto the paved area of the street by residents and/or contractors plowing, pushing, or blowing snow from a driveway. Snow being redeposited onto the street can result in a citation

to the homeowner. Village Ordinance 1020.03 prohibits pushing or blowing snow from a driveway into the public street. Redepositing snow onto a plowed street can form ice, which presents a hazard to vehicular traffic and hinders subsequent snow removal efforts. The Village trucks plow snow to the side of the road and the snow may drift across driveways. It is the property owner's responsibility to remove any snow that is deposited across a driveway to a non-paved area during snow removal operations. Please do not redeposit snow onto paved areas of the street. Do not park on the street during snowfall. When snow starts falling, remove your car from the street. Plows going around a car parked on the street will not be able to return to clear patches of snow where the car was parked.

One way to reduce the amount of snow in front of your driveway is to place the snow along the right side of your drive, as you face the street (see diagram). This reduces the chance of snow removed from your driveway being pushed back across your drive. This suggestion, however, may not work where driveway openings are placed close together.

Illinois workers are owed more than \$5M

More than 7,000 Illinois workers are owed more than \$5M in back wages recovered by the U.S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division.

Yet, a significant portion of that money remains unclaimed because some of the workers due back wages cannot be located. In many cases, the employees change jobs or change addresses and cannot be notified of the money due them. Name changes or an employer's failure to retain contact information can also make it difficult for us to find employees and put back wages recovered into their hands.

The Wage and Hour Division can only hold unclaimed back wages for three years before we are required to turn it over to the Department of the Treasury. Despite our best efforts, too much of this money remains unclaimed.

To reach out to more workers and help them claim the money they are owed, the agency has developed an online search tool, Workers Owed Wages (WOW) that allows workers to enter information to find out if we are holding back wages on their behalf. The tool provides a quick and easy way for employees to find out if they are owed money and receive it.

The WOW system is currently available in English and a Spanish. Last year, WHD also updated the WOW website to make it more user-friendly and offer ways to search the database, and we enhanced security.

Frozen pipes can burst if left unchecked, and in the cases of unoccupied properties, frozen pipes may not be noticed until it is too late.

Business owners should continue to perform maintenance tasks on their properties, especially in the winter months. A snow removal expert can provide consultation for the outside property, but the inside of the building requires care as well.

Pipes are one of the most important maintenance concerns due to their propensity for freezing as temperatures drop. Clean-up and repair due to lack of preparation can be costly. Below are tips to help prevent pipes from freezing:

Check for Leaks: Inspect all water supply points including bathrooms, kitchen areas, utility areas and basements. Note if any pipes or spigots need repair and have this fixed as soon as possible.

Insulate Pipes: Many pipes do not have proper insulation to prevent them

from freezing in cold weather. Pipe sleeves and heating tape can be applied to insulate the pipes. It is also a good precautionary measure to caulk around gaps where cold drafts can affect pipe temperatures.

Set the Thermostat: There are numerous money saving tips that tell property owners and managers to lower the temperature of the thermostat at night, but in the winter, this can promote pipe freezing. Instead, leave the heat on at night, or, if you will not return to the property for some time, lower the thermostat to 55 degrees. Do not go below this temperature, or frozen pipes may still be possible.

Circulate Air: Open cabinets located under sinks to help warm air get to the pipes. Doors to unused rooms that house pipes should also be kept open to prevent freezing of pipes.

Keep Out Drafts: Cold air leaks can drop the temperature in a room, potentially allowing the pipes to freeze if the temperature drops

too much. Prevent this by wedging towels beneath outside doors to keep drafts from finding their way into the building.

Let the Faucets Drip: Letting even a small amount of water to flow through pipes can do a lot to prevent pipes from freezing. A steady drip is all that is needed to keep the pipes free from ice accumulation.

Use Preventative Maintenance: Additionally, commit to a regular preventive maintenance schedule that includes routine inspection of all pipes, plumbing, pressurized drinking-water or fire-water systems, and any other water entry points and sources. Attention to basic infrastructure and systems will enable the discovery of unexpected or slowly brewing problems (e.g., aging, or faulty pipes, drips, or condensation problems). Taking steps to correct problems will prevent them from turning into catastrophes (e.g., burst pipes, or slow or sudden leaks, resulting in damage, corrosion, mold growth and many other possible problems).

Invest in Smart Sensors/ Detection Systems: Implement an early detection system such as a flowmonitoring sensor device with a remote valve shutoff feature and smart leak sensors. Both devices send alerts via smartphone, tablet, or computer, so leaks can be repaired while damage may still be easily containable and corrected before a much larger problem develops.

EP student wins state award

An Evergreen Park Community High School junior is now a two-time winner of the Illinois Disabled American Veterans Auxiliary Junior Member of the Year award.

She's now the Disabled American Veterans Auxiliary Junior Member of the Year for both 2022 and 2023.

"My heart always sings when I see her doing things for veterans," said Jeannie Jaworski, commander of the Midlothian DAV and Canon's grandmother.

Canon, an EPCHS junior, has been volunteering at the Midlothian DAV for about three years now. She began organizing parties and helping with various tasks at meetings as a way to give back to her grandfather, Richard Jaworski, a Vietnam era veteran.

"He went above and beyond in serving our country, so I wanted to do my part in giving back," Canon said. Jeannie Jaworski added that her granddaughter would "do anything for her grandfather."

As part of her volunteerism with the DAV, Canon serves pizza at meetings, helps veterans get to and from their cars and helps feed homeless veterans every winter, among other things. Canon is also the organizer of the DAV auxiliary's winter pet food drive for the Animal Welfare League in Chicago Ridge. In three years, she's raised more than \$1,000 to help the cats and dogs at the shelter.

Her award as the two-time Illinois Disabled American Veterans Auxiliary Junior Member of the Year came with a letter of recognition from Paula Raymond, the past national commander of the DAV auxiliary.

"In a time when young people have many activities to participate in, you have chosen to help the people who have made it possible for you to participate in those activities," Raymond wrote. "The fact that you are so willing to give of yourself and your time to help veterans is greatly appreciated. You are the future of our organization, and with individuals like you, we will continue to fight for veterans' rights and benefits."

With more young people like Canon needed to keep DAV auxiliaries across the state and nation strong, Jeannie Jaworski said her granddaughter has inspired at least two other girls to join as junior members, and they both "seem to enjoy it as much as her."

Chicago's 65+ population climbed to 14.3%

It is no great secret that America is getting older. The birth rate in the U.S. has fallen by more than half since the early 1960s. Typical life expectancy in the U.S. has increased by around a decade over the same span. And the last members of the Baby

Boomer generation, which totals more than 75 million members, will hit their 60s starting in 2024.

These developments are all pushing older Americans to be an increasingly large share of the population, with far-reaching implications for society and the

economy, a decreased labor force, strained government budgets, and an increased need for health and social services.

These are the key takeaways from the report for Chicago, Illinois:

In 2012, seniors made up 10.9% of the population in

Chicago. By 2022, that figure was 14.3%, an increase of 3.4 percentage points.

Overall, Chicago is not aging quite as fast as the country as a whole, which saw a 3.6 percentage point increase over the same period.

Orland Park Public Library Unveils New Online Room Reservation Process

As part of the library's commitment to enhancing patron experience, Orland Park Public Library, 14921 Ravinia Avenue, Orland Park, Illinois, is thrilled to announce a significant upgrade in the meeting room reservation process. Effective now, paper-based Meeting Room Reservation Use & Agreement forms have been phased out and replaced by an online booking system. Recognizing the evolving needs of the community, this shift aims to streamline the reservation process.

Patrons who have previously utilized library meeting rooms will no longer need to fill out the traditional Meeting Room Reservation Use & Agreement form. Instead, they can reserve meeting spaces through the library's user-friendly online calendar system accessible on the library website at www.orlandparklibrary. org.

This new online booking platform presents several advantages. Patrons can browse room availability and make reservations from any internet-enabled device. Patrons can view room availability in realtime, enabling patrons to select the most suitable time slots that align with their needs. The userfriendly interface guides patrons through the reservation process step by step, ensuring a hassle-free experience.

Meeting rooms are for use by Orland Park resident cardholders to hold community meetings. Orland Park business property owners can reserve meeting rooms as well for staff meetings. Nonprofits and Government Organizations may reserve meeting rooms as well. An example of a meeting is a Boy Scout troop meeting.

The library has 3 meeting room spaces. Large Meeting Room 104 can hold up to 200 meeting attendees on the first floor of the library. The Multipurpose Room on the second floor of the library can be reserved for smaller groups of about 15, and Meeting Room 104A offers a board room-style meeting space. Due to its size, Large Meeting Room 104 offers two projector screens and microphones. The smaller meeting rooms have a TV screen in them that groups can attach their laptop to and show presentation slides on.
