

Police Chief Rossi Graduates from FBI National Academy

At the March 20, 2023 Village Board meeting, Mayor Keith Pekau announced that Chief of Police Eric Rossi has graduated as a member of the 285th session of the FBI National Academy. The graduation took place at the National Academy in Quantico, Virginia on March 16, 2023. Chief

Rossi joins the few before him in department history to complete this prestigious program. Nationally, fewer than one percent of public safety professionals have the opportunity to attend the program.

Internationally known for its academic excellence, the National Academy offers ten weeks of advanced communication, leadership, and fitness training. Participants must have proven records as professionals within their agencies to attend. On average, these officers have 21 years of law enforcement experience and usually return to their agencies to serve in executive-level positions.

The 285th session consisted of 247 law enforcement officers from 47 states and the District of Columbia. The class included members of law enforcement agencies from 28 countries, four military organizations, and five federal civilian organizations.

"This was a great opportunity for Chief Rossi to broaden his already exemplary skills," said Mayor Pekau. "This is a tremendous benefit to the Village of Orland Park as well as the men and women of the Orland Park Police Department."

Rossi has been a member of the Orland Park Police Department for more than 19 years serving the community as a patrol officer, bicycle patrol officer, field training officer, investigator, patrol sergeant, lieutenant in administration, Investigations Commander, Deputy Chief and now proudly serves as Chief of Police.

"Attending the FBI National Academy has been a highlight of my career," said Chief Rossi. "I have met so many great leaders and learned from highly educated and well-respected professionals. I look forward to bringing this great leadership training back to the Orland Park community."





Hello Neighbors, With the arrival of spring, it's a great time to renew our commitment to sustainability and take action toward protecting the environment. In this spirit, I would like to share some helpful tips on recycling and two upcoming community environmental events.

By following some simple guidelines, proper recycling is possible and will ensure that our waste is diverted from landfills and reused in an environmentally responsible way. First, keep in mind that most bottles, cans, paper, and cardboard can be recycled and follow these tips:

Recycle plastics labeled #1, #2, #3, #4, #5, #6, and #7; Plastics labeled #1, should be screw top only and without caps; Plastics labeled #2 include milk jugs, water bottles, detergent, and shampoo bottles, remove caps; Narrow and screw top containers labeled with #3, #4, #5, #6, and #7, without caps; Rinse out and remove any food debris from glass, tin or aluminum cans, plastic containers, and cardboard containers and avoid putting plastic bags and pizza boxes in your recycling bin as they can cause issues at recycling facilities. Instead, consider recycling your plastic bags at your local grocery store.



The AFI Conservatory Cinematography program has propelled women and non-binary cinematographers to great success, including Academy Award® nominee Rachel Morrison (Black Panther, Mudbound), the first woman ever nominated for an Oscar® for Best Cinematography, as well as Emmy® nominee Ava Berkofsky, ASC (Insecure), Carolina Costa (High School, Hala), Autumn Durald Arkapaw, ASC (Black Panther: Wakanda Forever), Paula Huidobro (Academy Award® Best Picture winner CODA), Mimi Leder (The Morning Show, as director), two-time Grammy® Award winner Melina Matsoukas (Beyoncé's "Formation," Insecure, as director) and Polly Morgan, ASC, BSC (The Woman King), among others.

"The AFI Cinematography Intensive for Women is designed to inspire participants to pursue professional opportunities and to also instill a passion for inclusive approaches to leadership," said Lighthill. "With recent trends, it is important that we support women and nonbinary cinematographers, and we look forward to welcoming the aspiring cinematographers for this transformative program."

The hands-on master classes in the fundamentals of cinematography will constitute the core of the program, along with discussions about the current environment of the film industry and what it means to navigate such environments as women, nonbinary and historically underrepresented cinematographers.





"When sugary cravings strike, this trick helps to reduce the effects of acid production," said Dr. Theis. It's also helpful to limit snacks between meals when possible.

Being mindful of how food choices affect overall oral health is an investment in a healthier future. It's never too late to start building healthy habits. This March and always, make a commitment to good oral health and better nutrition.



Knowing the purpose of your yard and how it will meet the needs of your family and pets is a great start to getting "backyard ready" for these warmer weather activities. Also, knowing your climate zone and the mix of trees, shrubs, grass and flowering plants that will grow sustainably is key to designing a dream yard. After all, our yards are not only an oasis for family but also for wildlife and important pollinators such as birds, bees and butterflies.

right equipment on hand can help you save time and effort if you don't want to hire a professional.

Follow equipment manufacturer's guidance for safety and usage of all outdoor power equipment. Look over the manual for your equipment for a refresher on how to safely use it, and read the safety information on equipment manufacturer's web sites. Review how to shut on and off equipment and make sure safety features are working and have not been disabled. Never disengage or disable manufacturer-installed safety equipment.

Remember to keep children and pets away from outdoor power equipment. No children on mowers.

Do not mow in reverse, and avoid starting, stopping or turning a mower on a slope. Follow manufacturer guidance to the letter on mowing on slopes.

Service equipment as needed and according to manufacturer's directions. Well-maintained equipment will last longer and run more efficiently.

Buy fresh fuel for gasoline-powered equipment and be sure you have matched the correct battery with the right charger. Use only those batteries that are authorized for your equipment and do not use counterfeits.

Before working in the yard, clear the area of dead limbs, sticks and debris. Inspect trees for damage and clear the work area.

By keeping this information in mind, you can get your yard in its best shape safely.
