For the Record with Manager Dave Niemeyer

As many of you may remember, last year the Village of Tinley Park was in talks to buy and annex the 114-acre parcel of property at the northeast corner of Vollmer Road and Harlem Avenue from developer Rick Heidner. While those talks ultimately fell through, I'm happy to report we've been able to work out an agreement that allows the Village to annex the land into Tinley Park and retain control over what will be developed there.

The land has always been in the Village's planning area per the boundary agreement with Matteson in which both communities agreed the area should eventually become part of Tinley Park. The boundary agreement expired a number of years ago, and attempts to renew the agreement with Matteson have

been unsuccessful. This is important because, without annexation, the Village would lose control over what's developed there should another community such as Matteson try to incorporate it into their municipal boundaries.

In 2019, Mr. Heidner bought the property as a possible site for a racino. When those plans fell through, he sought approval for Office, Research and Limited Industrial (ORI) zoning, which would allow for various uses on the property. At that time, however, the Village Board was not supportive of his request.

The Village's interest was renewed in 2020, however, when Amazon announced it was going to build a four-story distribution warehouse, with a 3.8 million-square-foot floor area, on the southeast corner of

Vollmer and Harlem, thus changing the character of the entire area and making the Heidner property much more valuable for distribution warehousing. The Village negotiated with Mr. Heidner to buy and annex the property to control development of the site. Unfortunately, these talks fell through. After this, Mr. Heidner signed a contract with Scannell Properties to sell the land to them at a significantly higher cost than what we were discussing buying it for from him.

Recently, the parties met and were able to reach an agreement. Scannell's plans propose a multi-phased industrial business park development with approximately 1.3 million square feet of floor space over three industrial buildings in the Office, Research and Limited Industrial (ORI)



Zoning District.

One of the Village's main priorities with this new development is to reduce the impact of noise and traffic on the surrounding neighborhoods. To this end, the Village's planning staff has been working with Scannell to provide for a high-quality and safe business park.

The business park's layout was designed in a way to provide efficient and safe truck circulation inside the site and on the adjacent roadways, and it allows for truck and employee access to signalized intersections.

Village says goodbye to Chief

The Village of Tinley Park would like to wish a warm farewell to Fire Chief Forest Reeder, who will retire Tuesday, June 1.

Chief Reeder has been in fire service since 1979. He previously served as division chief for the Des Plaines Fire Department, director of training for the Southwest United Fire Districts, battalion chief for the Pleasantview Fire Protection District, and captain/shift commander for the Palos Fire Protection District.

Chief Reeder has received numerous awards and is co-author and supervi-



ing editor of three editions of a best-selling fire service textbook/curriculum. He's also an Ironman Triathlon athlete who has competed in eight full-distance races.

Deputy Fire Chief Steve Klotz will serve as Interim Fire Chief until a permanent replacement can be found.

Mokena, Orland Park approve boundary agreement

As a matter of due course, your Mokena Village Board has approved a boundary agreement with the Village of Orland Park.

Approval came at the Board's May 24 meeting.

Mokena has maintained boundary agreements with neighboring communities for a number of years. Mokena already has boundary agreements in place with Tinley Park and New Lenox.

Among other things,

Monday's agreement sets I-80 as the boundary line between Mokena and Orland Park, provides for cooperation between the communities in the enforcement of subdivision controls for properties that may develop in unincorporated Will County, and fosters the two municipalities working together to promote economic development in the area between Wolf Road and LaGrange Road.

Palos Park debuts Red Bird Vehicle Stickers

This Year's 2021-2022 Vehicle Sticker features the beautiful RED BIRD, which proudly welcomes visitors to the Kaptur Administrative Center. In wanting to bring another art form to Palos, Palos Fine Arts purchased RED BIRD for the Village.

The artist, Al Beadle, started his career in Phoenix in 1951.

Beadle was born September 23, 1927 in St. Paul, Minnesota. He learned construction from his fa-

ther, who built kitchens for hotels and restaurants. He also received training in construction during World War II as a Seabee. He built two houses in Minnesota before he moved to Phoenix in 1951. Beadle designed and built a variety of commercial and residential projects over the years, numbering well over 200.

Al Beadle was known as an uncompromising architect who embraced International Style modern architecture. He designed

austere modular "Beadle Boxes" with floor to ceiling glass walls. Oh, what Al conjured up inside those glass boxes. He was a consummate magician. But instead of conjuring a rabbit out of a hat, he drew the outside in.

He developed his style throughout the sixties, seventies, up into the nineties, when he was being compared to Neutra, Mies van der Rohe, Oscar Niemeyer, Corbusier and others. Beadle brought the geomet-



ric symmetry of his glass boxes to the harsh climate of the Sonoran Desert and allowed the barren desert

to create magnificent vistas for his clients' enjoyment. We are honored to have a piece of that in Palos Park.



Federal Relief Fund: FEMA provides funeral assistance for families of COVID-19 victims



The Coronavirus pandemic has struck tragedy & grief within our communities while impacting nearly everyone worldwide. A federal program relief fund through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is providing funeral assistance for applicants who have incurred funeral expenses after January 20, 2020. If a family member or loved one has died due to COVID-19, you may be eligible to receive up to \$9,000 for funeral expenses.

The program can cover costs including transportation of up to two people to identify the deceased,

transfer of remains, casket or urn, a burial site, a headstone, arrangement of the funeral ceremony, cremation costs, use of funeral home equipment or staff and any additional expenses mandated by any applicable local or state government laws or ordinances. For reference, the median cost for a funeral with a viewing or a burial in 2019 was about \$7,640; if a vault or casket was included, the cost rose to \$9,135.

Here's what you need to know about the funeral reimbursement fund and if you may be eligible for assistance:

There is no set deadline to apply.

The applicant must be a U.S. citizen, non-citizen national, or qualified alien, however, it is not a requirement for the deceased to be. The person's death must have occurred in the United States (or a U.S. territory) and the funeral expenses must have been sustained after January 20, 2020.

Below is a list of *some* information you will be required to provide:

- Social Security number

& date of birth for both the applicant and the deceased individual

- Death certificate: must signify the death was caused by, may have been caused by, or was likely the result of COVID-19 or symptoms related to the virus

- Current mailing address and telephone number for the applicant

- Funeral expense documents

Additionally, if applicable, be prepared to provide proof of funds that were received from other sources that were specifically designated for funeral expenses as FEMA cannot duplicate

benefits from funeral and burial insurance (life insurance proceeds are not considered a duplication of Funeral Assistance benefits). A more detailed list of program benefits and additional information you'll be required to provide can be found here: <https://www.fema.gov/disasters/coronavirus/economic/funeral-assistance/faq>.

To apply, you can call the COVID-19 funeral assistance line at 844-684-6333. Each call will take roughly 20 minutes and there will not be any online applications accepted. Reimbursements are limited to \$9,000 per funeral, with a

maximum of \$35,500 per application, per state. Upon approval, you will receive a check or direct deposit (whichever is chosen during the application process) within 14 days of applying.

SPRINGFIELD — The Illinois Manufacturers’ Association (IMA) released the following statement after Gov. JB Pritzker signed SB72 into law last month:

“Across Illinois, manufacturers have developed life-saving vaccines and treatments, produced personal protective equipment for first responders and health care professionals and have kept grocery stores stocked with safe and nutritious foods. Instead of being supported, these essential facilities will now be hit with tens of millions of dollars in additional costs,” said Mark Denzler, president & chief executive officer of the Illinois Manufacturers’ Association.

“Policy makers should be focused on supporting manufacturers to spur economic recovery from the pandemic, not making it harder for businesses to hire workers and invest in our communities.”

10 Myths About Resilience (and How to Really Raise Kids Who Thrive)

Most parents naturally want to raise resilient kids. After all, life is filled with pitfalls, setbacks, and disappointments. COVID is Exhibit A. But even aside from the pandemic, uncertainty is our new normal. We are constantly bombarded by news of economic distress, mass shootings, and political upheaval, and all of this causes stress (and sometimes even grief) to build in our kids.

As parents, we desperately want our kids to be able to bounce back from all of this. Resilience is what allows them to withstand such difficult life events and go on to thrive. It is a protective buffer that helps kids realize they can endure despite adversity. Unfortunately, says Dr. Michele Borba, too many of us focus our parenting on goals that don't build this vital strength.

"Many parents push kids to be overachievers with

super high GPAs," says Dr. Borba, author of *Thrivers: The Surprising Reasons Why Some Kids Struggle and Others Shine* (G.P. Putnam's Sons, March 2021, \$27.00). "Meanwhile, resilience is falling by the wayside and kids are really struggling. Straight A report cards or even high IQs don't mean that much when kids are stressed, anxious, depressed, and otherwise fragile."

It's not that we shouldn't want our kids to succeed academically, says Dr. Borba, it's that this should not be our singular focus. We also need to help our kids build other strengths outside of academic success. They would be better off long term if we focused our parenting on the strengths that help kids build resilience, and ultimately, thrive throughout life.

So, if studying hard and excelling at extracurriculars doesn't build resilience,

what does? To answer that question Dr. Borba cites the work of psychologist Emmy Werner, who over 50 years ago began a four-decade investigation of hundreds of children living on the Hawaiian island of Kauai. Werner hoped to examine the impact of stressful life events on children's development from birth to age forty. Nearly a third of them were born into poverty or faced problems like family discord, family mental illness, or family histories of substance abuse.

Two thirds of this group developed serious problems like behavior issues, substance abuse, and mental health problems. Yet Werner found that one out of three of the children in this high-risk group defied the odds and grew into "competent, confident, and caring" adults and thrived in school and life despite adversity.

Werner discovered that despite enormously different types of trauma many resilient kids shared two unmistakable strengths: Strong bonds with at least one supportive adult and a set of learned strengths that served as protective factors in their childhoods to help them meet the world on their own terms.

The fact that a third of the group overcame tough circumstances and went on to thrive tells us creating perfect conditions for kids to succeed is not the answer, asserts Dr. Borba. Working to help them develop the right character strengths is more important. The good news is that ordinary interactions, like conversations and activities that unfold organically, can foster these strengths and have an extraordinary impact on a child's ability to rebound.

In her book Dr. Borba builds on Werner's re-

search as well as other longitudinal studies on resilience. She explains how to instill in kids the character strengths that build resilience and make it more likely they'll become Thrivers. But before you can set about building resilient kids you first need to understand some of the common myths about resilience.

Borba says there are seven essential character strengths that both increase resilience and empower kids to go on to become Thrivers. And each is teachable. They are:

Self Confidence: Establishing a healthy identity and using personal strengths to find purpose and meaning.

Empathy: Understanding and sharing another's feelings and acting compassionately.

Self-Control: Managing stress, delaying gratification, and strengthening

focus.

Integrity: Valuing and adhering to a strong moral code and ethical thinking.

Curiosity: Having open-mindedness and a willingness to try new ideas, take risks, and innovate.

Perseverance: Exhibiting fortitude, tenacity, and resolve to endure so as to bounce back.

Optimism: Learning self-advocacy and keeping unrealistic pessimism in check to reduce despondence and encourage hope.

"Each of the seven character strengths is like a superpower that helps safeguard kids against the depression and anxiety that threatens to derail them," notes Borba. "Even better, when these superpowers are combined, they create a Multiplier Effect that makes kids more adept at overcoming obstacles and successfully navigating life in general."

The Palos Park Police Department is warning residents about one of the latest cybersecurity threats. Real estate and rental fraud is growing. It can happen with a forged deed created by using easy to access online data. Thieves try to file paperwork with the county claiming they are the homeowner. Since the true owner is typically unaware until it's too late, they don't discover what is happening until they receive a letter indicating they are being foreclosed on.

Thieves will pick a house,

sometimes a second home, rental home, or vacant home, and they gather personal information from the internet or elsewhere. They will then take over your identity and assume the role of property owner or claim to represent you. They file the necessary paperwork to transfer ownership of your property to themselves using forged signatures and fraudulent identification. Often they sell the home or borrow against the equity.

Palos Park Police reminds everyone to review your bank account and

credit report regularly and look for (and report) the following:

- Unfamiliar transactions.
- Unknown new accounts.
- Sudden changes in credit score.
- Unauthorized credit inquiries.
- Changes regarding your property taxes.
- Changes in your utility bills.
- Changes to your mortgage statement.

Also be aware if an expected bill never arrives.

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'The Copenhagen Trilogy' by Tove Ditlevsen



Before I read *The Copenhagen Trilogy*, I knew very little about Denmark. My mother told me that mermaids come from there. My daughter told me that it has the largest sperm bank in the world. My grandmother told me that's where her father abandoned his wife and children.

So, I didn't know anything about Tove Ditlevsen, who wrote over 30 books of poetry, short stories, novels, memoirs, essays, radio shows and a weekly advice column, from age 18 until a few months before intentionally overdosing on drugs at 58. Her acclaimed memoir, newly translated in 2021, is a masterpiece of remembering.

Despite being shaken, disconcerted and depressed by *The Trilogy*, I couldn't put it down.

May was "Mental Health Awareness Month," and Ditlevsen's darkly honest memoir makes us disturb-

ingly aware. When I read: "Childhood is long and narrow like a coffin, and you can't get out of it on your own," I was hooked on the book the way Ditlevsen described her addiction to "Demerol. ... The name sounds like birdsong. I decide never to let go of [something that] can give me such an indescribable, blissful feeling."

Ditlevsen came by her depression honestly: her maternal grandfather "drank a whole bottle of schnapps every day," Ditlevsen's mother tells six-year-old Tove "and in spite of everything, things were a lot better for us when he finally pulled himself together and hanged himself." Her surroundings are bleak; she suffers from rickets and diphtheria; she calls herself ugly, stupid, and coldly opportunistic.

Her father loses his job shoveling coal and her brother hacks all day from the paint fumes he inhales as

a young apprentice. Her mother is mercurial, unhappy, and violent. Her neighbors are drunks and sex-workers or serve in the Salvation Army. It's always cold, and frequently damp and dark. She's exposed to rapists and perverts, witnesses murders and learns that "death is not a gentle falling asleep as I once believed. It's brutal, hideous and foul-smelling."

Yet, Tove calls childhood the best part of her life. Literary fame, lost love and devastation follow. She rues an unwanted pregnancy: Men "don't have any tender, soft organs where a blob of slime can attach itself like a tumor and completely independent of their volition, start living its own life."

Writing, she knew from an early age, was her vocation and her protection, which drove her, "unwillingly, from those I should be closest to." Like other artists, she devoured and dissected herself, her family, her friends and lovers to tell us their stories. We ought not waste that abuse: Get her books.

Construction Agencies Would Accept E-Signatures Under Bill

SPRINGFIELD — An emergency rule enacted to streamline the state's contracting processes during the height of the coronavirus pandemic could now become permanent after a push from Illinois' engineering industry. The legislation, introduced by the American Council of Engineering Companies of Illinois (ACEC-IL) would

make permanent the requirement for the Illinois Department of Transportation, the Capital Development Board, and the Illinois Tollway to accept electronic signatures.

First utilized during the coronavirus pandemic when social distancing and other restrictions were strictly enforced, state agencies and indus-

try professionals have found that the use of electronic signatures helped to reduce red-tape, improve efficiency, and streamline contracting and invoicing processes. Electronic signatures are widely used in the private sector, enhancing transparency and reducing costs associated with printing and mailing documents with "wet" sig-

natures. Other agencies in the public sector are also quickly adopting electronic signatures for the same reasons.

The legislation, SB 2459, filed in the House as HB 2499 was approved unanimously in both chambers of the General Assembly and heads to Governor J.B. Pritzker for his signature.
